Key Points of the Annual Report 2017 "Japan's Actions against Piracy off the Coast of Somalia and in the Gulf of Aden"

Japan has engaged in counter piracy off the coast of Somalia and in the Gulf of Aden in cooperation with international community including dispatching the Japan Self-Defense Forces (JSDF) and the Japan Coast Guard (JCG)*. Piracy incidents, Japan's actions and its achievements in 2017 are as follows.



In June 2009, Japan enacted the "Anti-Piracy Measures Act". In July 2009, the escort **JSDF** commenced and warning/surveillance activities off the coast of Somalia and in the Gulf of Aden as the Counter-Piracy Operation under the Act.

Under the Act, privately contracted armed security personnel, who are confirmed by the Minister of Land Infrastructure, Transportation Tourism of Japan, can guard Japanese flag vessels in the Pirate-Infested Waters.
